Visa Waiver Program Machine Readable Passports

Effective October 1, 2003, all visitors coming to the United States using the Visa Waiver Program will, in addition to the other visa waiver requirements, be required to present a machine readable passport. This requirement, originally slated to take effect on October 1, 2007 was accelerated to October 1, 2003 by Section 417 of the USA PATRIOT ACT. Those individuals not in possession of a machine readable passport by October 1, 2003 must apply for a new passport or apply or for a nonimmigrant visa at a United States Embassy or Consulate, **prior** to coming to the United States. Countries currently authorized to participate in the Visa Waiver Program are:

*Please note that citizens of Belgium have been required to present machine readable passports since May 15, 2003. Additional information regarding the Visa Waiver Program can be found at the United States Department of State, Bureau of Consular Affairs at http://travel.state.gov/vwp.html

The purpose of machine readable passports is to aid the United Sates border security efforts by arranging biographic information on the passport data page according to international specifications. This allows machine passport readers at ports of entry to quickly download an individual's information and compare it to information stored in existing databases.

Processing times may be delayed as the number of passport applications increases, so we recommend that all foreign nationals from visa waiver countries obtain new machine readable passports as soon as possible.
